

The conference was a valuable platform for learning and collaboration, bringing together land managers, contractors, and conservationists from across Northern Ireland, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, and England. It fostered the exchange of best practices and deepened collective understanding of peatland restoration and

Fourth Sustainable and Regenerative Tourism Training Programme Launched

We were delighted to launch our fourth Regenerative and Sustainability Training Programme, welcoming a further 11 businesses from across Cuilcagh Lakelands Geopark to participate in this engaging and informative programme.

The 14-week programme, facilitated by The Tourism Space, includes modules on energy and water management, Leave No Trace, biodiversity, accessibility and sustainability storytelling.

Participants include Belleek Pottery, Benmore Farm, Corleggy Cheese, Enniskillen Castle, Fermanagh Properties, Fika 33, Ice Cream Treats, Killyhevlin Lakeside Hotel, Lake Avenue House B&B, Share Discovery Village, and Wisteria Cottage. On successful completion of the programme, participants will proceed to join our established Regenerative Tourism Business Network.

This programme is funded by Cuilcagh Lakelands Geopark with support from Fermanagh and Omagh District Council, Cavan County Council, Failte Ireland, and Tourism Northern Ireland.



Geopark Attracts €343,073 ORIS Funding



Cuilcagh Lakelands Geopark, in partnership with Cavan County Council, is delighted to have been awarded significant funding through the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme (ORIS) to enhance outdoor amenities across the region, with the Geopark playing a central role in improving trail infrastructure, promoting heritage, and expanding access to nature. The funding, announced by Minister for Rural and Community Development and the Gaeltacht, Dara Calleary TD, reflects the sustainable Geopark's commitment to accessible recreational infrastructure, community engagement, and environmental stewardship.

Geopark Strengthens Commitment to Accessibility & Inclusion

Accessibility and Inclusion is a key pillar of the Geopark Charter. Recently Officers along with partners, funders and participants, attended a Divergently Together Workshop in Dublin City University.

The event included engaging talks and practical sessions on:

- -Accessibility as a Right, the Legal Context
- -Neurodiversity, Climate Change and Language
- -Sensing Climate; and
- -Alt Text & Sensory Language

This was a fantastic opportunity to learn from many professionals working in the areas of accessibility and inclusion and importantly engage with the very users who rely on us to do our part to ensure our sites are accessible for all. Lough Navar Scenic Drive Reopens

Upgrade Works at Turbet Island

Turbet Island, located just across the bridge on the River Erne in Belturbet, is a peaceful spot ideal for walking, picnicking, and enjoying nature. Thanks to Geopark funding, recent upgrade works have enhanced the Turbet Island trail, as well as the path leading to Belturbet Heritage Railway Station and the Woolly Mammoth sculpture.

Improvements include upgraded fencing. Interpretation panels and signage have also been refreshed to enrich the visitor experience. These works are nearing completion and will further enhance access and enjoyment of this scenic and historic location.
